What is important is to think how we continue to be a people of prayer and respond to God's call. The resources

Linking them into the Year for *Missio* will be very appropriate as well as beginning to think about how we will keep 2020 as a Year of the Word of God, called for by our bishops.



ADVENT challenges us each year – especially in the context of the Black Friday shopping spree and everything else that the world holds dear for Christmas. We need to find ways of ensuring that we help the message of Christmas find its rightful place in our preparations for Christmas without being seen as some form of spoilsport brigade.

One thing to do is to encourage Christmas cards which tell the Christmas story. You can also demand stamps with the Virgin and Child from your post office. Bless your **ADVENT WREATH** but please make sure it has only four candles, one for each week. Somehow a central candle has crept in probably for commercial reasons! The Wreath goes after the Fourth week of Advent to be replaced by the crib!

Advent Resource For many years the Catholic Church in England and Wales, has observed Bible Sunday on the Second Sunday of Advent and created resources for both Bible Sunday and for Advent as a whole. Most recently this has been with the considerable and invaluable support of Bible Society. There is an invitation to participate in and promote Journey with Jesse created by Bible Society and the Catholic Bishops' Conference of England and Wales. This Advent resource specifically focuses on the ancient tradition of the Jesse Tree. We are encouraged to delve into our Bibles and read about the people and events that lead to Jesus' birth, about his own genealogy, and then decorate our Christmas trees with the signs and symbols of these Scriptural texts. Free copies of the Jesse Tree resource are available to encourage this creative way to read the Scriptures as part of our Advent preparations. The season of Advent is a time of joyful expectation. However, this can be lost as we rush towards our celebration of the Incarnation. Perhaps this Advent, in your own pilgrimage with Jesus and as a school, you can find time each day to ponder the wonder of the season? There are lots of ways of doing this, for instance, create a Jesse Tree to illustratesthe account of salvation from Creation to the Nativity of Jesus. Wonderfully, in Bedford we shall build this each Sunday of Advent as our young people will bring forward seven plaques at the Sunday Mass representing a Biblical theme to hang from the 'tree'. Our newsletter will contain an explanation of each plague and there will be loanable resources for families to take home and learn more about this ancient Catholic tradition! There will also be an opportunity for people to make a financial donation at the Jesse Giving Tree; this year it will support our parish youth project and "Mission Together" (an aid agency for children which is part of Missio) which is celebrating its **175th anniversary**. Thus the monies collected at the Jesse Giving Tree and then the Christmas Crib will help us support young people in our town and across the world. "Mission Together" has created lots of new liturgies,

assemblies, craft activities and an Advent Calendar to help schools journey through the Advent season (see the website for details). Pope's Catechesis on the Ten Commandments

The Pope's catechesis on the Decalogue is now coming to its close. If nothing else, these Wednesday audiences remind Christians and all people of good will to revisit and reflect anew upon the 'Ten Words'. These audiences are all to be found on the Vatican's website by clicking on 'Audiences' on the home page. There is plenty in this series of catechetical teachings to provide discussion starters in a classroom. In general, the Pope's catechesis on the Decalogue forces us to consider the meaning of the 'Ten Words' God gave to Moses and Israel far beyond their letter to the very heart of what it is to live in humility, truth and love in the sight of God.

For example, apart from the fifth commandment, breaking which other commandment can be a form of killing, according to the Pope? Answer: 'You shall not bear false witness'. The Pope says: "Be careful! Those who gossip are like terrorists because their tongues throw a bomb and then they calmly walk away, but what they say with that bomb destroys the reputation of others. Do not forget: gossiping kills." And in the Pope's catechesis on the Fifth Commandment, there is this remarkable statement: "Not loving is the first step to killing; and not killing is the first step to loving." Another topical example, was the recent ban on expensive designer coats by a school in Birkenhead justified? Though some have called the ban 'absolutely ridiculous', the school justified its ruling as a way of 'poverty-proofing our school environment' and stopping 'poverty-shaming'. A discussion about this could, for example, be related to the Tenth Commandment about covetousness, to the Fourth Commandment about honouring parents (since schools act in loco parentis), to the First Commandment against idolatry (in that showing off can be a form of selfworship) and perhaps even to the Eighth Commandment about not bearing false witness (in that the young are attracted to brands which sell a dream rather than a reality). And the consumerism of which brand-worship is a symptom is not unconnected with the fact that Sunday is now less and less a day set aside for worship and rest and more like a working, shopping day like any other day.

As we enter the season of Advent, the Pope's down-toearth catechesis can help us examine what truly drives us. As a time of repentance, hope and expectation, Advent should force us to reflect on what is false and what is true in culture. Catholic schools are uniquely situated to challenge a culture which proffers an Advent-free, Christ-free Christmas. If December is just so many shopping days to Christmas, then something is wrong. And yet this year, Selfridges in London gave itself the dubious distinction of being the first department store in the world to open its Christmas shop - on August 1, '145 days early'. This sort of thing, though it makes 'business sense', can easily become the enemy of that patient expectation that should mark

The Aramaic 'Maranatha' often means 'Come, Lord Jesus!' This echoes the prayer right at the end of the Bible: 'Amen; come, Lord Jesus'. To pray this truly is to yearn for what the world cannot give. It is to yearn for Christ. Just as Christians remember the coming of the Christ child into our world as a tiny infant, they also wait in joyful hope for the Second Coming of the Christ, as glorious as the first was humble.

'Stay awake, praying at all times for the strength to survive all that is going to happen, and to stand with confidence before the Son of Man'.

Recruitment to reserved posts in schools A number of questions have been asked to clarify the position on appointing leaders to posts within our schools. I enclose an extract from the document *Christ at the Centre*.

The importance of the role of teaching staff is acknowledged by the Catholic Bishops' Conference of England and Wales: "The preservation and development of the quality and distinctive nature of Catholic schools depends on the faith, practice and commitment of the teachers in our schools, working with their Governing Authority."* The Bishops require that the Headteacher or Principal, Deputy Headteacher or Vice-Principal, Chaplain and Head of RE/RE Coordinator must be practising Catholics.

*Memorandum on Appointment of Teachers to Catholic Schools and Academies- September 2012

This requirement is enshrined in Canon Law and therefore not an issue for discussion or interpretation. School leaders are aware of the need to identify and nurture colleagues with leadership potential and we need to work together at school and partnership level and across the Diocese to provide opportunities for these colleagues to gain experience and expertise. In addition, we need to reach out to Catholic teachers working in schools outside of our schools.

Please ensure that you alert the Diocese if you are recruiting to any reserved post, we are happy to support you in the process and represent the Diocese in the interview.

Revised application forms for all posts are available on the CES website as are the updated contracts and policies. These have been through consultation with the unions.

Developing Catholic Education in the Diocese
Discussions are continuing with leaders across the
Diocese on the development of Catholic education in
our schools. The key drivers for the discussions are:
School Improvement

- There is inequality and inconsistency in the ease of access to school improvement across local authorities and MATs
- We are in a strong position with strong leaders, governors and talented teachers within our schools to support one another
- Ensuring no school is isolated

Leadership and Governance

- The current policy of 7 smaller MATs requires 7
 Chief Executive Officers and 7 Chief Finance
 Officers. This raises the question of reducing the burden of compliance by working together and finding opportunities for efficiencies
- Providing opportunities for staff to develop leadership through working together

Finance and Resources

 Looking for opportunities of economies of scale in order to provide more funding for school improvement
