# Our Catholic schools

Why are Catholic schools free?

England is one of the very few countries in the world where parents have the right to choose to send their child to a Catholic school which is funded by the state.



For over 100 years Catholics in England raised money to build their own schools. They did this because they wanted their children to be educated in schools where they would learn about and experience Catholic beliefs and values.

Then in 1944 the Catholic bishops reached a historic agreement with the state. From that time onwards the state has met the running costs of Catholic schools.

## Keeping their Catholic character

The governors of Catholic schools are responsible for their school's Catholic identity. They employ all the staff. In other schools it is the Local Authority who is responsible for this.



*Catholic governors always appoint a Headteacher who values the school's Catholic nature and is dedicated to its Catholic life, including prayer.*

Governors also ensure that education for sex and personal relationships is in line with the Church's teachings.

Religious Education is given more time than in other schools, using text books written by Catholics for use in Catholic schools. By law, whenever the school has a government inspection, the diocese also inspects the school on behalf of the Bishop.

## How well do pupils achieve?

Catholic schools in the diocese and nationally are judged to be excellent.
